courts, showers, restrooms, sauna, etc. We have volunteers who maintain the pool and spa daily (testing the water, adding chemicals, monitoring the water level, cleaning, etc.), and the county of Sacramento also inspects them for compliance. The





pool heater and solar system requires maintenance and repair, which is also performed by our volunteers. They completely replaced the solar system a few years ago and did an awesome job! Then there are the bathrooms that need attention when pipes break, leaks occur, toilets don't work and the list goes on. And we also clean the vents. The weight room has some new equipment and newly cleaned rug; however, we still repair the treadmills as needed. The handball courts also require some maintenance, but that's mostly electrical, and due to the age of our facility, a lot of electrical maintenance is needed. Fortunately we have great electricians.



THE TILER



Also spelled "tyler." In the Latin tegere (from which came "thatch") meant cover, roof; tegulae were the tiles, pieces, slabs, used for roof-coverings. A tiler, therefore, is one who makes, or fastens on, tiles. Since in Operative Masonry the tiler was the workman who closed the building in, and hid its interior from outside view, the guardian of the entrance to the Lodge was figuratively called by this name. It was once supposed that "tiler" came from the French tailleur, a cutter, a hewer (from whence we have "tailor"), and it was accordingly spelled "tyler;" that, however, is incorrect, "tiler" being the correct spelling.
